Many Ventura County residents do not know that there's an aviation classroom at Camarillo Airport that offers free aviation classes to Ventura County High School students. It's called the Career Education Center. You may remember the concept, which back in the day was called ROP. However, when I was in high school they sure didn't offer any aviation classes at ROP!

Our VC99s member, Robin Sullivan, who is an Advanced

Ground Instructor, is a teacher at the Career Education Center and she hosted us for the VC99s January general meeting. Even though there were torrential downpours that night and we were all soaked, we had an awesome time. We started off with homemade chili and cornbread and then went over to the aviation classroom. Robin gave us the history of the aviation program which is the result of a successful partnership between the Ventura County Office of Education, the

Oxnard Union High School District and the U.S. Department of Defense Naval Air Warfare Center Weapons Division. It's also the first of its kind in the state of California, and we learned students are able to take the Private Pilot written test for no charge after completing the course.

The CEC Aviation Classroom contains rows of desktop simulators where students can fly all



different types of aircraft. All of us are pilots. However, most of us have never flown a desktop simulator before. Some of us were intimidated at first (me) and started off flying Cessna 172s etc.. But then as we got more comfortable . . . well let's try flying a King Air 350. Why not? What about a fighter jet? YES! Let me try this warbird now and let me try to land it!!! There were smiles and laughter and fun being had all

over the room. What an experience! Thank you Robin and the Ventura Office of Education Career Education Center for an enjoyable, fun and informative evening.


I am forever grateful to have been awarded the Student Pilot Milestone award from the Ventura County 99s! I recently completed my private pilot certificate in September of 2018, and the scholarship made an enormous difference as it enabled me to finish up my flight training in a timely manner. The scholarship money covered the costs of the final portion of my flight training, including my night flight, my solo cross country flights, and my checkride preparation with my instructor and mentor, Judy Phelps. The final payment-received after passing my checkride - has even started me on my tailwheel endorsement!

From the time I was a little girl, I was obsessed with aviation. I actually took my first lessons at age 12 (in the late 1980s), and dreamed of joining the Air Force as a pilot. However, I learned shortly after that - at that time - women were not permitted to fly in combat, so I abandoned my dreams until my late 30s. I relocated to Ventura County in the spring of 2017, and began flight training shortly after at CP Aviation in Santa Paula. At the same time, I opened up my own business in downtown Santa Paula, largely motivated by the fact that I was just down the road from SZP, if truth be told.

To some of my friends, working on my private pilot certificate at the same time as getting through the start-up phase of a business seemed financially risky - and maybe it was a bit, but the scholarship money greatly eased my stress on that end. And...the risk was worth

it, 110%! Earning my private pilot certificate has been the most empowering thing I've ever done for myself. I've always been both driven and practically minded; getting my private rating is just the first step for me. My goal is to transition out of college teaching (I've worked as a college professor, both full time and part time, since 2001), and into full-time flight instruction. The student pilot milestone award truly made a dif-

ference in my journey to becoming a CFI - I'm so excited to continue my training and advance toward my ultimate goal. Additionally, I'm excited to be an active member of the VC99s, to deepen my friendships with other members, and to volunteer at our events!

The 99s is an international group of around 5,000 women pilots. The Ventura County chapter hovers between 99-110 members. Our goal is to inspire the next generation of women pilots. We were treated to a success story at our last General Meeting on Tuesday, Feb 19 at the Aviation Museum at Santa Paula Airport. VC99s member, Victoria Cabrera, captured our attention with her talk about her outstanding professional pilot career as a Unicorn.....(female airline captain).

Like many of us, as a young girl, she didn't think females could fly an airplane. Her first exposure to aviation was a trip to visit her grandparents in Mexico as an unaccompanied minor. She sat at the window and was enthralled by the flaps moving and flight in general. Having attended Port Hueneme High School, she did not have any role

models in aviation however shelearned about Embry Riddle Aeronautical University and set her sights on going there. Though it was expensive, she felt it was important to get a bachelor's degree and professional training to become a pilot, and it has paid off.

Her pilot career started as an Intern at Cape Air in the Boston/Nantucket area which involved flying in at night and in snow. She then moved to DFW for a job at American Eagle flying the ATR 72, which she flew 1 year and then went to a ERJ 145, 50 seat regional jet. AMR went bankrupt, but she was able to get on with SkyWest Airlines based out of LA.

Then one day she was flying over Point Mugu and learned about a company called Phoenix Air, which



holds the contract to fly Navy personnel from China Lake and Pt Mugu out to the Channel Islands in an EMB 120 Brasilia Twin Turbo-Prop commuter. She applied for the job and got it. Finally a flying job where she could be home every night with her husband and weekends off! She loves the quality of life offered by this type of flying job close to home.

But flying into the Channel Islands every day is challenging. Weather is often just above minimums. A missed approach or holds are common. There's strong winds, strong cross winds and turbulence. On the plus side she gets to talk to celebrities like Tom Cruise on the radio and see jet teams like the Blue Angels.


Recently she was introduced to the 99s Professional Pilot Leadership Initiative. The PPLI is a 99s mentoring program that connects female pilots with

mentors. It helps pilots develop leadership skills and assists with strengthening career goals. With the PPLI program she has access to great advice and mentoring to pursue a higher position. She is paired with a mentor slightly ahead of her, career-wise. She has tasks to accomplish, which her mentor monitors. The program teaches how to set goals and become accountable to achieve them. Phase 3 of the program is giving back and mentoring another pilot who's a step behind her. She highly recommends the program to all professional 99s pilots. I have been dubbed "bi-chapteral" since I divide my time living and flying out of Santa Paula and Big Bear City, but my membership continues with the Orange

County 99s. I would like to share this achievement with the Ventura 99s.

"There's a new face that has garnered a lot of attention in Big Bear politics. Marikay Lindstrom received the most votes in the hotly-contested Big Bear Airport District Board of Directors full term election on November 6."

The above is a direct quote from The Grizzly, the local Big Bear newspaper.

I awoke the day after the national primary election last November to the news on my phone. Surprised, humbled and exhausted would best describe my spirits that morning.

I campaigned enthusiastically giving speeches, handing out flyers and hot pink buttons stating "Throttle forward up and away, Vote your ballot for Marikay". Big Bear Valley was cluttered with political signs, mine were different. Instead of the traditional red-white & blue, they were hot pink and not very big. Got a lot of slack but they were obviously effective.

History with Big Bear goes way back including the first time I landed my little pink Cherokee at this high-altitude airport. So excited, I stopped right in the middle of the runway and began to cry—good tears—then someone radioed perhaps I wasn't in a real safe place and had better taxi to parking.

That was the beginning. Since then I worked the Unicom, flew 135 Operations in and out of Big Bear carrying passengers, cargo and bank checks throughout Southern California, most of the flights beginning at 3:00 in the afternoon returning home around 11:00 p.m. What an incredible opportunity and learning experience. Then one late night it began to snow, I did get safely home. It was so cold and dark. I still had to tie up the airplane. The ropes were frozen, I was freezing and said to myself, what am I doing? Are you"nutz"? So I said bye to flying in a snow storm and continued for many years working at Big Bear Airport which included being named Chief Pilot.

Big Bear Airport is home to Mercy Air, a new air ambulance service ready to transport a critically ill patient immediately to wherever they need to go. If disaster strikes and roads are closed, it is the only uncompromised way in and out of the Valley. It is a staging ground and communications center when fire or other disaster threatens. It is a high altitude training facility for military flying operations. It is a wonderful general aviation place to fly.

Come up and see me, as well as my picture on the airport wall.

What an honor to have been elected for the Big Bear Airport District Board of Directors. I look forward to being the best I can be for the airport I love so much.

I have been an Orange County Ninety-Nine since 1983 when I first learned to fly out of Meadowlark in Huntington Beach and then Long Beach. I served as SWS Secretary, participated in the Air Race Classic and several other races including Palms to Pines.

Just a footnote: recently becoming a member of the Flying Octogenerians" I got a call asking if I would consider be on their Board of Directors. "Why would you want me?" I asked. "Well, you are one of the younger ones," was the reply.
